

Sources of Inspiration

Well, since we are not able to meet in person (again), the executive thought that we might be able to suggest some YouTube videos and library books on some techniques that you can try, instead of demonstrations by three of our members. We are hoping to have the three demonstrations at our March meeting. These three categories are not the same as the demonstrations in March.

Organizing your sewing room.

I know some quilters like to organize their sewing room between Christmas and New Years. I generally wait until I can't find things anymore. One book from the library is:

• 'Equipment and Supplies, Perfect Quilting Space'.

Carol advises that it has been signed out right now, but she has contacted the member and hopes to get it back soon.

There are plenty of videos on YouTube, but the one I liked was:

Since this person has a quilt shop, she suggests a lot of storage solutions, you can purchase.

There are numerous YouTube videos by Just Get It Done Quilts, including a 2022 challenge.

Carol MacDonald also suggested that we could send our own personal favourite organizing techniques to Michelle Murray and they can be put in the newsletter next month. Brilliant idea. I would like to know any tips anyone else has. My tip is a CD shelving storage unit case. (I know – nobody buys CD's anymore, but maybe you can find them at garage sales.) They are great to store fat quarters of slightly larger pieces and you can easily see what your collection of fat quarters is.

Landscapes:

Landscapes can be many sizes. I have seen Sue Hopkinson's postcard landscapes which are really neat, using all kind of embellishments and the guild has recently seen the wide variety of landscapes that Wendy Spreitzer (October meeting) has created. Maybe it's time for you to try a new project for 2022

Thread Painting

The third topic that was selected was Thread Painting. We have all admired Michelle Murray's Creations, so here are some ways to investigate this topic.

Carol MacDonald has suggested that you explore these library books. They might have some information on thread painting.

- Piecing: String Frenzy #280
- DVD Thread Therapy with Dr. Bob #273
- Superior Threads #274

This had the neat idea of using some pre-painted items from a needlework store.

This video also shows how you can paint your own background (not a talent of mind), but it is also very good on the actual thread painting.

• Thread Painting and Free Motion Quilting A Great Egret Art Quilt. https://youtu.be/IHvTFrhI7DE.

A couple of suggestions. Michelle Murray prints a picture onto white fabric and uses that to thread paint. Use an embroidery hoop when thread painting to keep the fabric tight.

Have fun and I hope you explore some of these ideas.


