## Playing with Colour

I want to share one of my favorite colour hacks. How many of you remember the **Colour Me Beautiful** trend in the late 1970's early 1980's? It was a popular book, by Carole Jackson, and businesses popped up everywhere to have your "Colours" done. They would analyze your skin tone, and choose a seasonal palatte of colours most suited to you. It was the four seasons. Summer and Winter were blue based tones, and Spring and Autumn were yellow based tones. It was quite remarkable to see the changes when they used the right colours for you. The idea behind it was if you stayed within your palatte, and bought your clothing in those recommended colours, that every item would match with every other item of clothing. Why not in Quilting then. I have used this theory in choosing my quilt colours for years. ## 25 Quilting Tips



- 5) Use PVC pipe to raise a banquet-type table (one with "T" type leg configuration) to a comfortable cutting height. The ends of the table legs fit inside the lengths of plastic pipe. Take the pipe off to return the table to sitting height.
- **6)** Use medium gray or taupe thread for all patchwork piecing except very light-colored fabrics.
- 7) Place a piece of white paper behind the eye of your hand sewing needle before threading. The paper will help you see the eye.

# tips Our best tips

- 1) Next time you're at your favorite quilt shop, ask for an empty bolt board. Wrap a towel around it and safety pin in place to make a lightweight, portable ironing surface to take to a workshop.
- 2) When threading a needle for hand sewing, moisten the eye of the needle rather than the thread. The moisture in the eye will help draw the thread through.
- 3) Loosen the paper backing of fusible web to remove it from appliqués by scoring the paper with a straight pin.

4) Do not use fabric softener when pre-washing fabrics or for projects you've appliquéd with fusible web. The agents in the fabric softener may prevent the fusible web from adhering or may loosen your appliqués.



8) Clean the lint from behind the blade of your rotary cutter and lubricate the cutter blade with a drop of sewing machine oil to keep it rolling smoothly. Shoot digital photos as you take it apart so you can reassemble it correctly.

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9) Make your own value viewer from a red plastic school report cover. Cut it in half and stack the pieces to make four layers. Use masking tape around the edges to keep the layers together.

**10)** Use a felt tip pen to mark the notch when you take the thread end out of a spool for the first time. You'll easily be able to relocate the notch to lock the thread end back in place for storage.






- 11) Use a shallow, opaque plastic storage tub for a quick, portable light table. Place an under-the-cupboard switch-on fluorescent light under the inverted tub and begin tracing.
- 12) Use a sticky note to mark the line you will use on your ruler when rotary cutting. The note does not have to be right on the line you want, just close enough to help you distinguish it from the other lines.

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- 16) Replace inexpensive fluorescent light bulbs with "gourmet" color-corrected tubes that are 90% true to natural daylight. Several brands are available at home improvement stores and are sold as sun equivalent bulbs. These bulbs also can help with seasonal affective disorder (SAD) that many people experience during winter months.
- 17) Save dull rotary cutting blades to use for cutting paper. Using a rotary cutter to cut pieces of gift wrap paper speeds up the wrapping process. (Be sure to use a cutting mat!)

- **13)** When working with fusible web, slide a paper grocery bag over your ironing board to protect the cover. Cut the bottom out of the bag to make it slide on easily. As you work, rotate the bag to position a clean area at the top.
- 14) Tape a used rotary cutter blade to a flat piece of cardboard with masking or duct tape before discarding so no one will be hurt digging through the trash.
- 15) Spray limp pieces of fabric with starch or spray sizing before rotary cutting. Starching the wrong side of flannel or homespun fabrics before you cut helps firm up the weave and thus reduces fraying when you sew.







18) At the home improvement store, buy a door security lens to use as a "reducing lens." Pin patchwork to your design wall, step back, and view through the lens. The lens distances you from your work, giving you a better idea of contrast and composition.

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19) Use the plastic instruction sheet that comes with interfacing or fusible web to make a pouch to store the product. Fold one section of instructions in half and stitch (or staple) the two long sides closed. Product and the instructions for use stay together!



25) Clean fusible web "goo" from your iron soleplate by ironing on a fabric softener dryer sheet. Put a paper bag on the ironing board first so you don't transfer glue to your ironing board cover.



- **23)** Place a wad of masking tape by your sewing machine to catch clipped threads.
- **24)** When making a signature quilt, press pieces of freezer paper to the wrong side of signature areas of blocks so fabric doesn't slip when people are signing.



- 20) A loop of quilting thread makes an instant needle threader for thicker threads like floss, pearl cotton, or yarn. Put the loop of quilting thread through the eye of the needle. Place the thicker thread through the loop; draw the loop back through the eye.
- 21) Use the flannel side of a flannel-backed plastic or vinyl tablecloth as a design wall. Cotton pieces adhere well without pinning, and the tablecloth is light and portable.
- **22)** Make a lint and thread remover by wrapping wide masking tape, sticky side out, around your hand.

**Fabric Required:** The Formula for the amount of fabric required is 6 repeats of fabric for the blocks. So if you have a 24" repeat you would multiply 6 X 24 which = 144", divided by 36" = 4 yards for the blocks (but buy 4 ½ to be safe). If you are going to use the original fabric in the borders buy at least 6 YARDS.

**Fabric Option 2**: You may choose to use a panel. Panels are often 24" wide by the Width of fabric (WOF). When using panels I buy 7 panels, six are for the 6 repeats needed. The 7th panel can be placed somewhere on the front with hexagons designed around the panel. To find the repeat, lay the fabric in front of you with the fold line near you. Find a design element which is easily identifiable near the fold, when it comes up again you have found the repeat. DO NOT PRE-WASH THE FABRIC!!!! Fabric

**Considerations:** The best fabrics for this process are large prints with little background, especially leaves or animals. The rule of thumb is once the repeats are aligned we will be cutting them in 3 ¾" strips. If the design elements in your fabric are smaller than 4" you will not be taking the design apart and your blocks will look like the original fabric. So choose LARGE PRINTS.

DO NOT PRE-WASH THE FABRIC!!!!

## **Dream Bars**

- ½ cup butter or margarine (softened in microwave)
- ½ cup sugar
- 4-5 Tbsp. cocoa
- 1 egg

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• 1tsp vanilla

Add the last 4 ingredients to softened margarine and microwave for 1minute.

Add: 2 cups graham wafer crumbs. 1 cup coconut ½ cup chopped walnuts

Mix well and press into an 8inch square pan

<u>Icing:</u> 2 cups icing sugar
½ cup butter or margarine
2 Tbsp. custard powder

Moisten with a little milk. Spread on top. Chill well
